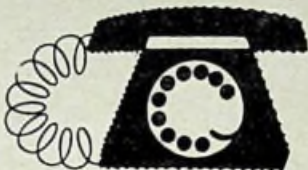

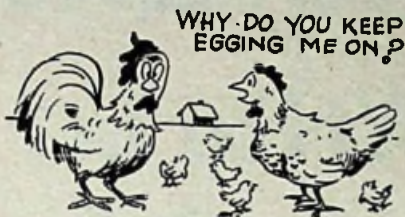

## On Sept. 10 Vote for Assistant Judge

## 2 County Schools Get New Principles



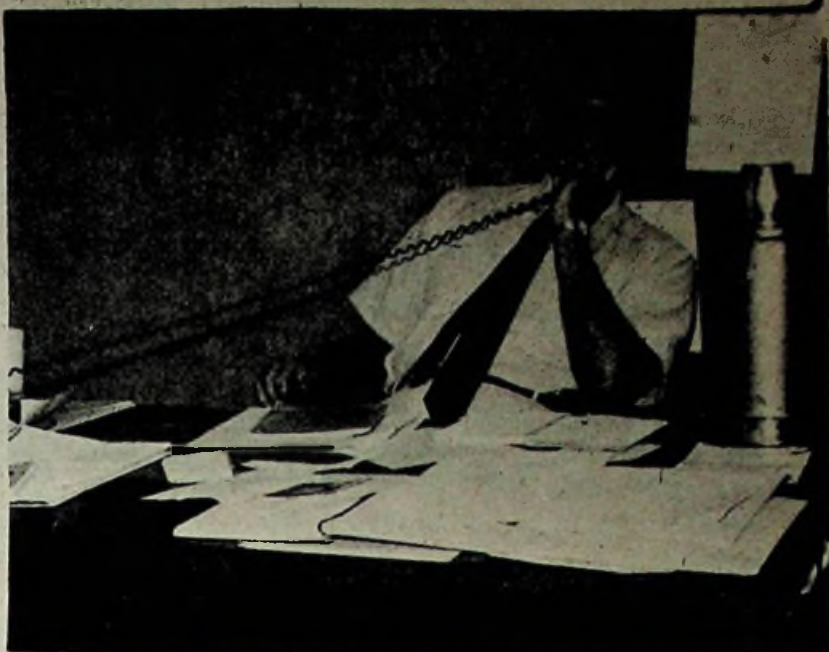

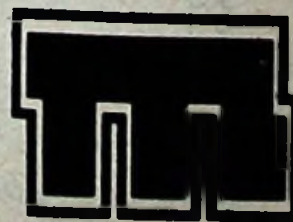
